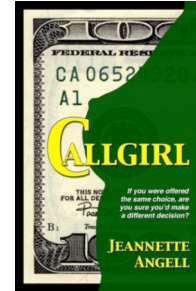


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CALLGIRL nominated for the ABA's Booksense Best Nonfiction Book of 2004 Award

Author's memoir of high-class prostitution is one of five nominees

January 24, 2005: The American Booksellers Association has announced the nominees for the 2004 Book of the Year. Among the five nominees for best nonfiction is CALLGIRL by Jeannette Angell. Voting (by booksellers) closes on February 28, 2005.

CALLGIRL is the story of the three years spent by the author working for a “mid-level” escort service in Boston while maintaining a teaching career during the day. Called “engrossing” by *Kirkus Reviews*, CALLGIRL has met with both critical and popular acclaim since its hardcover release in July of 2004. It will be released in paperback by HarperCollins in May of 2005. It has also spawned a number of similar works by other current and former sex workers.
